DAMON GAMEAU AT TRENTHAM

The first of three upcoming workshops being run at Trentham will feature guest speaker, Damon Gameau. Damon is the producer of *That Sugar Film*, which was followed by *2040*. His most recent work is a 17-minute documentary called



Regenerating Australia. Set on New Year's Eve of December 2029, a news anchor is ending the nightly bulletin with a look back at the decade 'that could be.' A decade that saw Australia transition to a fairer, cleaner, more community focused economy. The film is a construction of news reports and press conferences featuring real news anchors and journalists, politicians, business leaders and citizens.

A mix of media personalities and industry experts deliver stories about a highspeed rail network connecting regional areas and cities; the environmental and social effects of large-scale wind, solar, battery and hydrogen projects; and the impacts of landscapes coming to life when regenerative agriculture and reforestation programs combine with Indigenous knowledge and fire ecology.

Damon will talk about possibilities and positive steps to a sustainable future.

CHAINSAW CLASSES

Chainsaw classes have commenced across the shire with all courses fully subscribed. These courses were offered as part of the storm recovery efforts to help build skills within the community.

Day 1 was theory and chainsaw maintenance, while Days 2 and 3 were out on property for practical application. We look forward to the coming sessions and feedback from participants.

We have a total of 13 courses, which will be completed by mid-November. Due to such large interest in the courses, we applied for extra funding and provided extra places. There is a total of 78 people undertaking this training.





► SPA COUNTRY RAILWAY

Bushfire Recovery Victoria, on behalf of Council, is approaching the finish of the cleanup of Spa Country Railway.

The storm-thrown timber is almost all cleared from the track and will be handed back to Spa Country Rail once works are completed. An opening date for the track is yet to be announced.

The track runs between Bullarto and Daylesford.

R U OK? No qualifications needed

R U OK day is on 8th September. This initiative reaches millions of Australians annually, however if you find the idea of asking someone if they are ok a bit confronting, you are not alone. Forty percent of Australians think this question is better asked by an expert. Unfortunately, identifying that someone needs support can happen in an instant, leaving you to ask the question... expert or not. This year, the theme 'R U OK? No Qualifications Needed' addresses the challenge of asking. The website has the resources you need. There are conversation guides, tips for making sure you are in the right headspace to ask the question, and for extra support if needed. There are also some great resources for building an R U OK? culture within your organisation.

EMERGENCY BOOKS FOR **CHILDREN**

The picture books were developed by Queensland Health to talk children through what happens in a disaster, how they might feel, and what the process is for recovery.

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► NATIONAL WATTLE DAY

1st September is National Wattle Day and this year it falls on a Thursday. Bring in Spring by celebrating Wattle Day. The wattle is a resilient native Australian species and is tolerant against drought, wind and bushfire and represents the spirit and strength of the Australian people. The Golden wattle (Acacia pycnantha) was officially gazetted as Australia's national floral emblem in 1988. The vibrant shades of yellow and green, a unifying and iconic symbol of our country, is also a welcome sign of the beginning of spring.

With over 1,000 wattle species, of which more than a dozen are indigenous to the Hepburn Shire, many more are commonly grown in gardens. Most of the indigenous species are found in the forested hills and reserves, along creeks and the native forests of the municipality, with some species occurring along country roadsides. Hepburn Shire is also home to the dwarf silver-wattle (Acacia nanodealbata) which is rare in Victoria and Hepburn Shire with few known populations. The species is endemic to Victoria.



Regeneration

Wattle seeds have a hard case and can remain viable in soil for decades, and they often need a fire to stimulate germination. Wattles are known as 'pioneer plants' and regrowth after a fire is often very dense but over time, plants naturally 'thin-out' to lower densities.

Insects Guide

There is a guide to the Insects of Central Victoria and copies are now available from the Trentham Library.

Many species of insects, such as the Leaf beetle and including some butterflies such as the Imperial Hairstreak, Twospotted Line-blue and the Tailed Emperor breed and feed on species of wattles and its seeds. The insects attracted to the wattle flowers are also an important food source for most bird species including Black cockatoos and honeyeaters. This makes acacias a significant focus for biodiversity.

Wattle Days

For more than a century Australians in different States and the territories celebrated their own wattle day on different days In July, August, and September whenever the wattles were blooming at their best locally. The first celebration of wattle day took place, however, on 1 September in 1910 in NSW, Victoria, and South Australia.

You can celebrate National Wattle Day by wearing a sprig of wattle on your shirt, take a quick walk in the park and enjoy the bursts of yellow, take a minute to learn what you can do for the environment or light up your house, garden in wattle colours — green and yellow.
